



NAUVOO, Ill. - A Nauvoo man died Monday morning of injuries suffered in a one-vehicle accident which occurred at 9:40 p.m. Friday on Illinois Route 96 ½-mile south of Nauvoo. Michael J. Yager, 54, died at 7:35 a.m. Monday at University Hospitals in Iowa City.

Officials said Yager was driving a 1982 Datsun northbound on Route 96 when his vehicle left the roadway, came back across the road striking an embankment and rolled three times before coming to rest on its wheels. Yager was ejected from the vehicle.

Keokuk man is among five killed in Iowa Ammunition depot blast

BURLINGTON (P) — An explosion at the Iowa Army Ammunition Depot the third in less than a year — killed five men Friday.

Investigators were combing the rubble Saturday in an attempt to determine the cause of the explosion, which occurred in a building in which conventional mines were stored, according to assistant plant manager George Mathes.

The blast blew apart the building's tile walls and part of the roof. Adjacent warehouses were not damaged.

Mathes said "relatively few" of the concussion-type mines in storage magazine, or warehouse, exploded.

Four of the victims were identified as Gary Wayne Lawrence, 24, of Lomax, Ill.; Gary Raymond Young, 23, of Keokuk, Iowa; Robert L. Walker, 23, of Burlington, and Willis Bogan Henson, 37, of Stronghurst, Ill.

The name of the fifth victim was withheld pending notification of relatives, who were traveling.

Mathes said there were no reports of others being injured. More than 7,600 persons are employed at the plant, which is on a 20,000-acre site about seven miles west of Burlington.

The plant commander, Lt. Col. Frank O. Munn, said a gate keeper was within 500 feet of the building when it exploded, but he was not hurt.

The plant is operated for the Army by Mason and Hangar-Silas Mason Co., Inc., of Lexington, Ky. The firm has operated the plant since 1951.

It was the third explosion in less than a year at the plant.

On June 22, 1967, an explosion at the plant killed four women workers and injured four others.

Two persons were injured in another blast last May 2.

Henry Young, the only son of My. and Mrs. John W. Young, and a young man very popular in Keokuk, died in a base hospital in France on Sunday, October 20.

The news came to Keokuk in a letter from William E. Brugman, formerly boys' secretary of the Y. M. C. A. hare to his wife, and in a form that precludes the hope of any mis' take. The name of Private Young has not yet appeared in the casualty lists reaching this side for publica-

Mrs. Young is prostrated by the news of the death of her only son, and all Keokuk grieves with the famity in their sorrow.

As soon as Mrs. Brugman received the news yesterday, she telephoned James Young who broke the news to the family.

The letter from France told how

Brugman Fortunately on Ground.

"Arrangements had been made to bury him this afternoon, Sunday, but for some reason the funeral was postponed until tomorrow. After Henry is laid away, I'll try to write to Mrs. Young and to secure what facts I can which may be a little comfort to them."

The particularity of the facts given by Mr. Brugman, and his getting them directly from the headquarters clark in charge of the roster of the regiment, dispels any hope that the news might be a report current in the army which might turn out to be incorrect.

It was fortunate that so good a man 'as Mr. Brugman, a personal friend of Henry Young, should be in such close touch with the event, and doubtless further details of the last illness of the soldier will be received in the next mail reaching here.

Was Well Two Weeks Previously.

Only last Saturday the family had received a letter from him dated October 8, in which he told how comfortably they were located near a city in southern France and that he was well and happy.

He was with the headquarters company of the 337th artillery, and the letter stated that he was to go soon to an instruction camp.

In previous letters he had reported that he did not have much energy, but made no complaint. He was not of rugged physique, but had lots of grit, and never once made any complaint of the hardships of training and duties. In fact he hardly mentioned his work, and bore the hardships without a murmer.

Private Young would have been thirty-one years old tomorrow. He was born in Kcokuk November 8, 1887, and lived here all his life, the family home being at 718 Grand ave-

Student at Illinois University.

He attended the public schools and was a graduate of the Keokuk high school. He attended the state university of Illinois for two years and took military training there. He left here in June 1915, and went

to Camp Dodge where he stayed until the division headquarters went to

France a short time ago. He was a member of the United Presbyterian church and was a young man of high type of character.

He was reserved in his nature, but a friend once made was always a friend. He was devoted to his father and mother and to his only sister. Miss Mamie Young. Because of this close family tie, his death comes as a particularly heavy sorrow to them.

HIS FUNERAL IN FRANCE

The Burial of Henry Young in the Soil He Died to Save Keokuk From the Hun Was an Impressive Onc.

John W. Young received official notice from the adjutant general yesterday afternoon that his son Henry died from bronchial pneumonia in an army hospital.

The funeral of Henry Young. the Keokuk soldier who died in a hospital in France, was held October 21, and four other Keokuk men were pallbearers. These were Kinnamen, Cosgrove, Brugman and Honce.

They laid the Keokuk boy to rest in the soil of France that he had died to save from being overrun by the Huns. A little procession formed a short distance from the cemetery and slowly made its way to the open graves—for there were three other soldier boys to bury there.

The regimental band played a dirge in the lead of the solemn procession, folowed in turn by a firing squad and marching men, principally from his company. Private Young had many friends at his funeral services.

The chaplain talked impressively, the body was reverently lowered into the ground, a volley rang out over the beautiful landscape, and a bugle sounded the always beautiful strains of taps. Then they all marched away, their hearts will always throb as they think of that scene over there.
